IMPROVING THE EDUCATION OF CHILDREN To The Residents of Minnesota:

As a public school, a charter school necessarily incurs the public's trust, both in expending public funds and in educating public school children.

As a sponsor of charter schools, Friends of Ascension believes it also incurs the public's trust in fulfilling its oversight obligations. The purpose of this report is to honor that trust by reporting, to the public, the academic and fiscal performance of Friends of Ascension sponsored schools.

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OUR MISSION: To improve the education of children.

HOW WE BEGAN: Friends of Ascension became involved in education by supporting Ascension School in 1999, a grade school in an area of North Minneapolis which has the following demographics:

- Almost one-third of the population (31.7%) have incomes below the poverty level.
- Minority population = 76.7%
 - ♦ African American = 51.2%
 - ♦ Asian = 17.9%

Although affiliated with the Catholic parish of Ascension Church, 90% of the student body of Ascension School is non-Catholic.

In 1999, before Friends of Ascension implemented the Saxon math program in the school, Ascension grade school performed at a 21% proficiency rate on the Minnesota mathematics standardized assessment tests. Friends of Ascension also assisted the school with implementing the Core-Knowledge sequence developed by E.D. Hirsch, Jr. and the Core-Knowledge Foundation. In 2000, Ascension School achieved an 80% proficiency rate on both the Minnesota standardized mathematics and reading assessment tests. The success continues: In 2005, the students achieved a 91% proficiency rate on the math test and a 95% proficiency rate on the reading test.

In 2003, Friends of Ascension decided to expand its reach, while maintaining its stated mission to improve the education of children, and sponsor quality charter schools.

Due to the tremendous success achieved at Ascension School with the Core-Knowledge sequence and Saxon math, Friends of Ascension sponsors only those charter schools which implement a content-rich curriculum. Friends of Ascension also requires that its sponsored schools implement a phonics-based reading program rich in literature and a sequential math curriculum typified by the Saxon or Singapore math programs.

Friends of Ascension is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit Minnesota corporation, incorporated in 1999. Friends of Ascension is a member of the Minnesota Council of Nonprofits and is registered with the Minnesota Office of the Attorney General.

Why Content Rich?

Friends of Ascension sponsors only those charter schools which provide students a content-rich curriculum such as the core knowledge sequence or the classical trivium. Why? Because foundational knowledge is critical to life success.

A primary academic difference between the advantaged and disadvantaged child is vocabulary size. Advantaged high school graduates generally know eighty-thousand words, whereas disadvantaged students know half that. Does it matter? Absolutely.

Knowledge builds on knowledge, and obtaining that knowledge requires more than phonemic skill: it requires having a wide vocabulary in order to *understand* what you're reading. How do you obtain a wide vocabulary? It necessarily results from exposure to a correspondingly wide knowledge.

Bill Gates frequently addresses school students, telling them that wide reading and general knowledge are critical to competence. Why does he believe that? Bill Gates, after all, is indisputably a critical thinker engaging in creative competencies which some say are more important than knowing facts. But Bill Gates, and others like him, know a lot of facts. If he didn't he couldn't be such a critical, creative thinker. In fact, psychologists tell us that knowing more makes one better able to learn new things and to think critically — that critical thinking comes only after factual knowledge.

Moreover, independent studies repeatedly demonstrate that, where schools emphasize broad factual knowledge, students become more curious and engaged. They're being set-up for success.

Characteristics of Friends of Ascension Sponsored Schools:

The right curriculum: Content-Rich

Friends of Ascension sponsors those schools dedicated to providing students a classic, content-rich education based on proven methods.

The right academic standards: High

All Friends of Ascension sponsored schools demonstrate a no-excuses philosophy, which recognizes that all children can learn. The schools employ frequent testing to measure student progress.

The right size: Small

Friends of Ascension schools are smaller than traditional schools, generally less than 300 students. The schools also have lower student/staff ratios, some less than 15:1.

The right learning environment: Secure

Friends of Ascension sponsored schools establish behavior standards in language, dress, and manners.

The right oversight: Accountable

Friends of Ascension holds each school accountable for its academic and fiscal performance. Friends of Ascension measures performance and requires schools to enact remedial action when necessary. Friends of Ascension has revoked one charter and initiated revocation proceedings in two other cases, which caused both schools to enact corrective action.

Content-Rich Curriculum: What it means

Core Knowledge

Summary:

The Core Knowledge sequence is based on the proven method that education is more effective when students learn a specified body of common content in a coordinated, grade-by-grade sequence that permits them to build on prior knowledge without repetition or gaps. The Core Knowledge sequence promotes equality by not assuming students will learn needed information from sources outside school.

In each grade, students are exposed to a broad range of historical, scientific, and cultural topics that build on one another to prepare for later educational success. This wide range of subject matter not only develops cultural literacy but also builds the strong vocabulary necessary for reading comprehension.

Instructors teach the subject matter in the manner most effective for them, but the content is specified and builds from year to year. Following are examples of specific content requirements for each grade (this is not an all-inclusive list):

Language Arts: Language Arts began with phonemic awareness, and decoding, so that mastery of these skills is achieved by grade 3. All grades, from K-8, emphasize vocabulary building and comprehension, primarily through literature ranging from Mother Goose, Fairy Tales, and Aesop's Fables in K; Alice in Wonderland, Norse Mythology, and Iroquois Legends in grade 3; Don Quixote, Shakespeare's Midsummer Night's Dream, Chief Joseph and Frederick Douglass speeches in grade 5; to Tolstoy and Dostoyevsky short stories, Maya Angelou poetry, and Martin Luther King Jr.'s essays and speeches in grade 8. Greek and Latin roots and foreign phrases commonly used in English are also studied to enhance comprehension.
