Not addressing the smoke problem could set you up for legal problems or to suits under the Americans with Disabilities Act.

2. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has stated that there is nothing in the law stating that apartment building managers cannot make their entire buildings smoke free. The HUD field office in Minneapolis has made a similar ruling.
