Dr. Mariana Mota Prado obtained her law degree (LLB) from the University of Sao Paulo in 2000, and her master's (LLM) and Doctorate (JSD) from Yale Law School (2002 and 2008). Prior to joining the University of Toronto in 2006, Dr. Prado worked for the Private Participation in Infrastructure Database Project at the World Bank (2004), and was a fellow of the Olin Center for Law, Economics and Public Policy at Yale Law School (2005). A Brazilian national, she regularly teaches intensive courses at Getulio Vargas Foundation in Rio de Janeiro, and has been collaborating extensively with Brazilian scholars on projects related to institutional reforms in Brazil. Her scholarship focuses on law and development, regulated industries, and comparative law. Her most recent publications include a book entitled <u>What Makes Poor Countries Poor? Institutional Dimensions of Development</u> (Co-authored with Michael Trebilcock), Edward Elgar (2011).
