<u>Canada drops from 1st to 6th place in TI 2011 Bribe</u> Payers Index

On 2 November 2011, TI released the 2011 Bribe Payers' Index (BPI), revealing Canada had dropped to 6th place from 1st, when the BPI was last published, in 2008. The BPI ranks 28 leading international and regional exporting countries by the likelihood of their firms to bribe abroad. Companies from Russia and China are perceived to be the most likely to bribe, with Dutch and Swiss companies seen to be the least.

The 2011 BPI also looked at bribery in various business sectors, with public works contracts and construction once more leading the way. According to this survey of 3,000 business executives from developed and developing countries, bribing public officials when doing business abroad remains far too common. For the first time, however, the BPI also looked at business-to-business bribery and found that it is almost as prevalent. This suggests that corruption is also a concern for the public sector, carrying significant reputational and financial risks for the companies involved.

<u>Canada also drops in TI 2011 Corruption Perceptions</u> <u>Index</u>

Canada also dropped in ranking in this year's Corruption Perceptions Index (CPI) from 6th to 10th. While Canada still remains the only G7 country in the top 10 of the CPI and is the highest in the Americas, its score dropped from 8.9 to 8.7, leaving considerable room for improvement in a score out of 10.

The CPI ranks countries and territories based on how corrupt their public sector is perceived to be, with TI's definition of corruption, the abuse of entrusted power for private gain, as the baseline. It is a composite index, a combination of polls, drawing on corruption-related data collected by a variety of reputable institutions. The CPI reflects the views of observers from around the world, including experts living and working in the countries and territories evaluated. In 2011, 183 countries and territories were ranked.

Corruption is difficult to prove empirically, which is why perceptions, often based on scandals, investigations and prosecutions, are measured. With Canada's scathing review from the OECD in the Spring for little or no enforcement of the OECD Anti-bribery Convention, the conviction of Niko Resources and the accompanying almost \$9.5 million fine, and the RCMP raiding of both Blackfire Exploration and SNC Lavalin offices, the recognition that corruption is indeed present in Canada is reflected in the drop in its score.



TI-CANADA MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION

CHARTER MEMBERS (Membership contribution -- \$5,000)

The purpose of charter membership is to keep the chapter on a sound financial footing. Charter members will have all the rights and privileges of other members and will be invited to assist in advising the Board on policies and programs. We welcome government departments and agencies as arm's length Charter members, but government members will have no voting rights.

PROFESSIONAL FIRMS (membership contribution -- \$1,000)

The designated spokesperson of a professional firm has full voting and participation rights at meetings of members.

VOLUNTARY SECTOR ORGANIZATIONS (Membership contribution range -- \$100 - \$500)

The designated spokesperson of an NGO has full voting and participation rights at meetings of members.

INDIVIDUAL MEMBERS (Membership contribution -- \$100)

Individual members have full participation and voting privileges at meetings of members.

STUDENT MEMBERS (Membership contribution -- \$20)

Student members have full participation and voting privileges at meetings of members.

ALL MEMBERS will receive newsletters/bulletins, information about conferences and workshops, and the right to participate in these conferences and workshops on a cost recovery basis. Membership in TI-Canada is generally available to all, subject to receipt of a Membership Application and Board approval of the Application. The Board may decline to grant such approval if, for any reason, the Board considers membership to be inconsistent or incompatible with the objectives, values and ethical principles of TI-Canada.
